- 4. "I always seek in what I see the likeness of something beyond the present and the tangible object". Explain P.B. Shelley's quote above using his "Ode to West Wind" and John Keats' "Ode to a Nightingale" (20 marks)
- 5. The Victorian Age is marked for a number of significant advancements in science and technology, yet poetic works from this period thrived on gloom, confusion and disillusionment. Why is this so? (20 marks)
- 6. The Faerie Queene combines features of religion and moral allegory on the one hand as well as those of the historical and political allegory on the other hand. Discuss. (20 marks)
